





Danny was a graduate of the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville and there received a Masters and a Specialist Degree in Education. He was a successful and beloved coach of basketball coach at Huntsville School District and then at St. Paul School District for many years. He retired as superintendent of schools for St. Paul and then came out of retirement to serve a tenure as superintendent of Winslow School District.

In 1966, Danny became the youngest legislator in Arkansas, when he was elected the first Republican since reconstruction to represent Madison and Carroll County in the Arkansas House of Representatives. He continued a life of public service after retiring from school administration by serving on both the St. Paul School Board of Education and on the Washington and Madison County Drug Court Advisory Board. He owned and operated his own tax preparer business at his home in Delaney.

Danny was an avid and well-known musician and had shared his passion for rock and roll piano with this family and community since he was a young man. Never idle, he still enjoyed making music and camping with his family and friends, traveling with his wife, and farming with his brother and son. He loved his neighbors and serving his community. Most of all, he liked being with his family and enjoyed the simplicities of a life well-lived.

Funeral services was Thursday, July 30, 2009 at the St. Paul High School Gym. Rev. Jasper Hankins and Judge Mahlon Gibson officiated. Burial in Patrick Cemetery.

# Greenland School District

Wednesday, August 19 is the first day of school in Greenland. We welcome back our returning students from Winslow. A sincere effort will be made to see that new students feel comfortable in our schools. High School Principal Hope Dorman (who previously worked in Winslow), Middle School Principal Jay Gardenhire (who also previously served in Winslow), and new Elementary Principal Alan Barton (who is a long-term Greenland resident) are committed to seeing that each student receives individual attention.

This past school year has been memorable. With expenditures reduced over \$1,200,000 from the previous year including paying off a \$620,000 operational loan, the District finished with a positive balance. As a result, we received positive feedback from the Arkansas State Board of Education. I project that June 2010 will see an increased positive balance. This came about because parents, other community members, teachers, administrators, and staff all worked together to generate increased revenues while decreasing spending.

I appreciate the opportunity to work with a wonderful group of Winslow residents as we work towards opening up the Winslow cafeteria/ gymnasium this fall for community activities and for some school academic tutoring. Rather than dwell on the past, we are focused on making the present beneficial for students as we work together to see that they have a bright future.

This year will find an increased emphasis on academics. Teachers and principals have been and will be studying ways to improve student achievement in mathematics and literacy. We look forward to increased partnerships with parents and grandparents as we work respectfully with them to see that their children are successful.

This summer our schools are humming with activities that include repairs, cleaning, professional development activities, ordering supplies, student activities, and budget preparation. We look forward to seeing many of you at community and school events. Together, we can make this a great year for children living in Winslow and Greenland.

## Will Health Care Reform Fly?

I must hand it to Obama for trying to do something about the cost of health care. Whether he is approaching it the right way or not, at least he isn't doing the same as the last 16 years of Clinton and Bush. All they did was compliment the airways with one flowery speech after another and watch it go out of sight.

Bush did try a couple of times to put the wheels in motion to create a limit on how much doctors and hospitals could be sued, which would lower the cost of insurance and thus lower the cost of services, but he encountered fierce and powerful opposition.

People come by the trainloads that can't afford an 8% deduction. Also, it is estimated that about 16 million younger people consider themselves quite healthy and don't want to pay anything for insurance. They are willing to take their chances, but they are the bread and butter for the insurance companies. Obama's plan would make them sign up and pay for insurance and the insurance companies take to that idea like pigs take to slop.

Then there are millions who are unemployed. Will they require an 8% deduction from unemployment benefits? Will a person owe the money after benefits run out? Will the government throw a person in jail that is breaking the law because of not having insurance but has no job and no money?

The questions are almost endless, and there are no easy answers. This is the worst recession in decades and a bad time to try and establish laws that will require the government to pry money from millions of people and businesses that don't have any money.

We certainly need something done to at least slow down the cost of health care, but it should have been started years ago when there was no recession. We have fallen behind the rest of the world, which shows in statistics. We are now 42nd in life expectancy, which means we would likely live longer if we lived in some other country. Nice thought for Americans.

I wish Obama luck, and I think it is going to fly, but not right away, as he would like, and not until some changes are made.

# Spool Quilt Instructions

Finished size 50"x60" (20 - 10" blocks).  
 1/4" Seam allowance used throughout.

## Materials

- 44/45" 100% Cotton-VIP Calico Cupboard.
- 1/4 Yard of each Calico for spool centers:
  - 47-P Pink\*, 47-W Wedgewood
  - 26-H Mint, 39-W Wedgewood
  - 36-L Lilac, 39-D Rose
  - 30-W Wedgewood, 26-W Wedgewood
- 3/4 Yard of 36-E Tan for spool "ends".
- 1 Yard of white/natural solid for background of each block.
- 3/4 Yard of 47-P Pink for inner border \*(3/4 yard will make spool centers and borders).
- 4 Yards of 26-W Blue for backing and outer border.
- Twin size batting, matching thread.
- Cardboard or plastic for templates.
- Silver colored thread for needle "applique".

## Assembly

Make templates A, B, C, D using cardboard or plastic template material.

*Be sure to add 1/4" seam allowances to all sides.*

### FOR EACH BLOCK CUT AS FOLLOWS:

- Template A - 1 print calico
- Template B - 2 white
- Template C - 4 white
- Template D - 2 tan print (36-E)

**Cut: For corners** 4 - 5 1/2" squares of white (seam allowance has already been added), also cut applique spools from template out of desired colors.

### CUT BORDER STRIPS AS FOLLOWS:

- Pink 47-P: 2 - 1 1/2" x 50 1/2"
- 2 - 1 1/2" x 40 1/2"
- Blue 26-W: 2 - 4 1/2" x 50 1/2"
- 2 - 4 1/2" x 40 1/2"

### CONSTRUCTION OF BLOCK:


Sew pattern piece B to each side of A.  
 Sew pattern piece C to each side of D.  
 Sew A & B pieces to C & D for top and bottom of spool block.

Press as you go. When all blocks are complete sew them together in horizontal rows, block 1 to block 2, etc. Some of the blocks can be turned if desired. See photograph.

Horizontal rows are then sewn together to complete the top. Press well.

Sew pink 47-P and blue 26-W border strips together. Sew side borders to each side of quilt top. Machine applique spools in corner squares. Sew machine appliqued corner squares to each side of top and bottom border strips, then sew top and bottom borders to quilt top. Press top well. Cut backing and batting to size of completed top. Place quilt top on batting right side up. Pin in center of each block. Place backing on top right sides together, pinning all around edges. Stitch all around outside in 1/4" seam allowance leaving a 12" opening for turning. Turn to right side. Slip stitch opening closed. Re-pin and machine quilt around each spool block and in border seam lines. Machine quilting can be easily done using monofilament thread in the needle and matching thread (for backing) in the bobbin. Using a walking foot, stitch in seam lines (stitching in the ditch). This can be done without a walking foot but this foot makes the work feed more evenly.

The needle and thread can be satin stitched in the corner and other blocks if desired.






Ozark Folkways has been blessed with two new board members, Arbor and Becky Buchanan. In this case, it takes both of them to make one, since they each can only give a small portion of their time. They are hard-working people with heavy responsibilities in their professional lives, yet are making time to help. They are welcome and appreciated. Caring individuals like these folks are what makes an organization succeed.

This has been an interesting summer as we make our way through what is probably the worst recession experienced since the "dirty thirties." One indication of just how serious the situation has been is that twice this summer, the donation jar that is kept on the sales counter has disappeared, money, jar and all. This has never happened before. Thievery almost never occurs at Folkways because the regional arts and crafts are predominantly one-of-a-kind and folks who appreciate handcrafted work seem to know how much skill and effort goes into the production of each piece. The last week of July was the annual art camp. In spite of the economy, attendance did not drop as it was thought might happen. Parents will still find a way to help their children develop skills and ways of thinking that will serve them well as they go through life. Erin Chapman, Tracie Slattery and Sarah Yager are faces from past art camps, volunteering selflessly. The Center for Art and Education in Van Buren provides all

the materials as well as personnel to instruct and facilitate the program. Joyce Bowman and Erin met last April to design the curriculum for the camp. Even the weather helped out by blessing the event with a cooler than usual July.

The next main event at Ozark Folkways will be the annual Fiber Arts Fair September 19th. Watch for posters telling all about it. There will also be a basket workshop and a writers' workshop. Freda Miller will teach the making of a large chore basket like the one she uses to carry supplies. This workshop will take place the Saturday before the fair, September 12th. Velda Brotherton will teach an Ozark Mountain Writers workshop on the 26th of September, the Saturday after the fair. These two workshops are each held twice a year.

It was no surprise to anyone who travels old 71 south that half the highway past the Lake Fort Smith park entrance fell off the mountain a few months ago. It had been threatening to do so for a couple of years and above normal amounts of rainfall this year finished the job. The old metal culverts had rusted out and collapsed, requiring replacement with culverts made of concrete. At one point, the highway was even completely closed for a couple of weeks, but, after many, many truckloads of rock fill, as of last week, the roadbed looks to be about ready for blacktopping. It will be nice to have two-way traffic again!

Now that there is a top-of-the-line four harness loom on site, there is an opening for a skilled weaver volunteer to come to Ozark Folkways to demonstrate a weaving-in-progress on a weekly basis; as is done with quilting and with rug hooking. 




