Future Winslow Community Center

A Winslow Community Center is coming! Tentative plans set an Adult Basketball Night for October 12th with plans for youth programs to follow.

A combined effort from local residents and the Greenland School District have been negotiating plans for the community center since last fall. Dr. Roland Smith spear headed the organization of a committee which oversees the general management of present and future plans for the center. Future plans and hopes include several organized programs such as senior citizen exercise, youth basketball, adult education courses and of course the options of reunions and other gatherings.

Tutoring will also be offered to Greenland School District students starting October 20th. This program is in it's infancy but will correlate with the Greenland Elementary school and assist in the set needs for those students attending Kindergarten through Fourth grades. Plans to begin upper level education for older students are in the early stages of planning.

Certified teachers from the district will be on hand for up to one hour once a week providing needed academic help with the future option of open youth exercise to follow those lessons.

The Winslow United Methodist Church has offered both a monetary donation and volunteers to help with custodial issues monthly. This is a great help as the center will have to rely on a lot of community volunteerism in cooperation with the school. Already many local community members have offered to help clean and monitor an adult night of basketball. Negotiations are also being arranged through the Winslow Community Development Council as well and greatly appreciated.

If all goes well with these first few programs then the hope is to utilize the old Winslow Gymnasium and Cafeteria to its fullest potential making it a benefit to our community once again.

Dr. Smith would like to thank the committee members who have spent their time volunteering for this project to finally come to its beginnings and continued thanks for its future. Dr. Smith also invites all community members to his monthly Town Hall meeting scheduled in the Greenland High School Cafeteria, October 15th at 6:00 P.M.



Sandy's Snippets: Health-Scare

The recent presidential speech on healthcare reform inadvertently highlighted the bitter partisan divide and the continuing reform-misinformation campaign.

Nowhere was this more exemplified than by South Carolina Congressman Joe Wilson, who, when President Obama assured the joint houses of Congress that health reform legislation would not include aliens, yelled out, "You lie!"

While this has made him very popular among the brigades of: "Obama is an atheist-Muslim, commie-socialist-liberal-pinko, illegal-alien, child-indoctrinating, granny-killer," it likely won't play well with increasingly conspiracy-fatigued mainstream America.

Why? Because mainstream America has been brought to its knees by an arthritic healthcare system that still displays remarkable agility in its schemes to deny hard-working Americans their claims.

Michael Moore's 2007 documentary, *Sicko*, focuses on families who thought they had very good insurance - that is, until they needed it most. The film highlights the devastation created by venal insurance companies who reward review panels for denying medical procedures that could cut into hefty insurance company profits. A doctor on one insurance company "death panel" expressed remorse for her actions and the resulting death of at least one man who had been wrongly denied potentially life-saving treatment.

In recently trying to sway a conservative social worker friend to my view, our conversation went something like this.

"You KNOW the system is broken and how difficult it is to get disability when too ill to work - how almost everyone is turned down the first time," I reminded her.

"Well, that's not always the case," she defended. "In my most recent case, a woman qualified immediately. She's dying of cancer...only a few weeks to live."

"Oh," bleeding liberal heart momentarily distracted, I said, "I'm so sorry to hear that; I guess she didn't have insurance."

"Oh, yes," she replied. "But the insurance company dropped her after she reached her resource limit."

She did not even realize the inherent inadequacy of her argument.

Let us hope that most Americans will not be so obtuse and will work to end insurance company death panels.

However, for all of the town hall attendees who fear a government take-over of healthcare, there is a very simple solution...Just say no to Medicare and VA care. Yes, stand on principle, and take your preexisting conditions to the free marketplace you claim to favor. Urge your representatives to abolish Medicare and VA care immediately, with no one grand-fathered in.

If you stand on such strong principle against government-run socialized healthcare politicians will definitely take notice. And, yes, you cannot get much more socialized than these very popular programs.

Medicare recipients receive three times more in benefits than they pay into the system. Medicare recipients also report greater satisfaction with their healthcare than those in the private sector.

Several years ago, Kaiser Foundation surveys revealed that among respondents 65 and older, Medicare was given a favorable rating of 80%. And 62% of seniors consider Medicare to be well run, while only 28% said that of private health plans.

While costs are high, Medicare costs are rising at a lower rate than healthcare costs in the private sector.

Undoubtedly Medicare is pretty dang socialist by the standards of those who would like to take the US Constitution back to pro-slavery days. Yet, it is not quite as socialist as the VA system, which is even more of a government-operated healthcare system than that found in much-maligned Canada.

Nonetheless, a study by the Rand Corporation revealed that Americans treated by VA hospitals, "received consistently better care across the

board, including screening, diagnosis, treatment and follow-up."

And, year after year, patients rate VA care higher than recipients of any private plan.

Still, seniors and veterans who oppose reform should stand on principle and just say no to government-operated healthcare programs. Your wallet may not appreciate you, but your principles will remain untarnished.

And while you're at it, be sure to speak out against the evils of other government-run programs like police and fire departments, libraries, schools, postal service, etc.

"Barney."

"Then that will be this puppy's name too."

We made it home without an accident from either the sleeping puppy or Frank's driving...and Barney's feet never touched the floor of the van.

Barney had problems at first adjusting to the living arrangements at my house because part of it was my business where I sewed for people. His place during nights and business hours was on a small enclosed porch where my desk was located. When he was in this room, he was very lonesome for company since he was used to having his brothers and sisters with him. Someone reminded me of this and I placed a large mirror against the doorway. When he saw his reflection, he thought it was a relative and slept right next to the "guy in the mirror." Someone else said that a calming noise would be a ticking alarm clock. That worked too. Barney was happy.

He was happiest when we went for walks around the yard. I never had to use a leash when he was a puppy. He walked right next to my feet. Then we would sit on the steps and watch people go by the house. We were close friends.

When Barney was a bit bigger and had learned to potty outside, I decided the mirror would be put up and the door left open. I'd just see whether he would stay in his bed on the porch. Bedtime. The mirror came down, the lights went out and I lay in my bed listening. After awhile, I heard little padded footsteps coming slowly into my room...then they stopped. They began again until they stopped at the foot of my bed. Silence. Then he hopped onto the bed and stayed at the edge probably making sure I was asleep. It was hard for me not to laugh for the next few minutes. Barney crept up my side...stopping only once...I think to gain courage...then with a big sigh, fell asleep in my armpit...a sign of true love.

A puppy like Barney loves to play. A puppy like Barney also loves to "nip" while playing. 
